All of this forces us more than ever to think about who we are and to continue, relentlessly, our work.


We know that we would never have been able to carry out our projects without you. It is again with you that tomorrow, Children Action will continue its fight for a better world.



APPROACH

MAKE A DIFFERENCE

IMPACT

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Making a difference is at the heart of all Children Action's commitments. The Foundation intervenes and supports projects that aim to have a long-term positive impact on the lives of beneficiaries.

Children Action runs its own programs or works on the strategic development, implementation and monitoring of projects in collaboration with its partners. It also acts as an incubator and catalyst for projects with the goal of accelerating the implementation of initiatives, replicating successful programs or transforming innovative ideas into concrete actions.

The Foundation mobilises with the determination to carry out projects in the sole interest of the beneficiaries, evaluating the ethical criteria, feasibility, quality and effectiveness of programs in the following areas:

- Access to care
- Education and nutrition
- Teen suicide
- Psychosocial support
- Wellbeing in hospital

In 2021, Children Action has conducted 16 projects in 6 countries:

- Argentina
- Myanmar
- Peru
- Sri Lanka
- Switzerland
- Vietnam

A participatory environment is developed for each project to increase the resources needed to implement the programs.

Thanks to this system, via local partnerships, the involvement of volunteer teams, donations of equipment, pro bono services from benefactors and cost optimization, the value of projects financed by the Foundation is multiplied by three on average.

In 2021, partnerships with the University Hospitals of Geneva, the d'Harcourt Foundation, the Kaleidos Foundation in Argentina, the Taller de los Niños Association in Peru, the Health Committees of 14 provinces in Vietnam, the participation of relatives, the collaboration with different structures and volunteers have contributed to multiplying the funds allocated by our donors.

As every year, all the salaries of the Foundation's head office and all the administrative costs were covered by the Founder, thus allowing the funds collected to be allocated 100% to the actions in the field.



PROJECTS

The pandemic has increased the psychological suffering of young people.

Lockdown and restrictions have disrupted daily life, education, and recreational activities. They have also generated in many children and teenagers a sense of fear, anger and concern for the future.

MALATAVIE - CRISIS UNIT - Geneva

Focusing its intervention on care and prevention, the MALATAVIE crisis unit offers, thanks to a multidisciplinary team, different modes of care (inpatient and outpatient) and prevention in order to facilitate encounter with young people in distress and to offer them the most appropriate response. This unit was created in 1996 in the framework of a public-private partnership between Children Action and the University Hospitals of Geneva (HUG), and celebrated its 25th anniversary this year.

In 2021, MALATAVIE prevention was particularly busy. The "Ados Line" (022 372 42 42), which offers adolescents and their families a professional response 24/7, received 2,033 calls from 991 callers. 72% were of a clinical nature, directly related to a sometimes acute suicidal risk. The prevention team also answered 492 emails, of which 346 were sent to the prevention address and 146 to the Ciao.ch website.

MALATAVIE inpatient care hosted 81 youths for 1,800 nights and 319 youths were seen on an outpatient basis.

ARTOPIE- Geneva

Set up in 2018, Artopie is an innovative pilot project combining care and culture. It complements the existing care offer and provides other approaches to suffering adolescents: mediations within and outside the hospital. It is an opportunity for young people to experiment with participative practices with the ultimate goal of comprehensive, multidisciplinary, complete and therefore more effective care.

Funded through a partnership with the Foundation d'Harcourt, this project targets the patients followed in the MALATAVIE crisis unit and in the various units of the Child and Adolescent Psychiatry service of HUG as well as the general public, aiming to create proximity between society and the medical field.

The pilot phase ended on 31 July 2021. The Artopie project has been taken over by the HUG, in the context of the upcoming House of The Child and The Adolescent (MEA), designed to offer a new perspective on psychiatry with an opening onto the city.

En 2021, the young people in particular:

- attended 21 music therapy workshops
- participated in film screenings as part of the International Film Festival and Forum on Human Rights (FIFDH) and awarded the Artopie prize to their favourite film
- made a graffiti with graffiti artist Jazi on a wall located near the hospital*.
- collaborated with urban typographer artist Ygrek to design a piece of work on wire mesh*

AIRE D'ADOS- Geneva

The aiRe d'ados project, bringing together health and social professionals, was created in 2014 to strengthen the network of young people in distress and to build a safety net around them.

In 2021, aiRe d'ados comprised 48 members and 56 partner institutions. This year, this structure, as an area of meetings and exchanges, organised a colloquium on the theme "Ruptures and transitions: what places for young people today?" with numerous speakers and 150 registered participants.

CLICK4HELP

In Geneva, many organisations offer a wide range of support and resources for young people aged 12 to 25, their families and the professionals who work with them. Children Action listed these resources on the click4help website where the desired information or help from these hundreds of organisations can be found with just a few clicks.

In 2021, 3,799 people visited the click4help website with 4,490 connections, an increase of 42% compared to 2020.

YOUTUBE CAMPAIGN

Initiated by Children Action in 2020 and continuing in 2021, this campaign invites youtubers to address suicide in a different way, each with their own style, in order to reach different communities of internet users. Each video features a list of help numbers. For example, Carmine addressed the misconception that people who talk about suicide are not thinking about acting out and committing suicide; Benjamin Friant focused on dispelling the belief that most suicides happen suddenly, without warning; Kiwyzzonk chose to focus his prevention message on raising awareness for the LGBTQIA+ population; MC Roger chose a song that delivers a positive prevention message.

The first four videos generated 103,823 views. The 18-24 age group was particularly reached with an 80% male audience.

MEA: the future House of the Child and the Adolescent - Geneva

The MEA will be open to children and adolescents aged 0 to 25 years from 2023. Focused on child and adolescent psychiatric care and medicine, the MEA represents a unique concept in Europe. It will position Geneva as a centre of excellence in Switzerland, offering a complete chain of care (outpatient consultations, day hospitals, inpatient beds) as well as cultural activities in a single location.

Understanding the medical and societal stakes of the project, Children Action, a long-time partner of the HUG, has played a leading role in the vision and implementation of the MEA. Its commitment from the early stages, both financially and in terms of planning, enabled the MEA to become a reality and the HUG to mobilise for extending the public/private partnership with the substantial contribution of another local foundation.

2021 was marked by the roofing of this building.

LIFE PROJECT- Zurich

The University Psychiatric Hospital of Zurich (PUK) approached Children Action at the beginning of 2019 to set up within its Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Clinic (KJPP) a care structure for young suicidal people inspired by the Malatavie crisis unit model comprising:

1. a prevention and early treatment unit
2. an intensive ambulatory care unit
3. a day care unit
4. an inpatient crisis care unit


On December 8, 2021, a three-year agreement was signed by Children Action and PUK to open Life Project in 2022. This facility will provide appropriate care for young people in distress in the German-speaking part of Switzerland.

ADO-LES-SENS LABYRINTH

From June 13 to 23, 2021, Children Action has set up a participatory installation entitled ado-les-sens LABYRINTH, around adolescence and suicide risk.

The Covid pandemic invaded the planet. This extraordinary situation caused many people to lose their bearings, to set up new dynamics, to reinvent their daily lives, to change their habits, to adapt. The lockdown period, during which each person found him/herself alone or with his/her family, exacerbated the relationship with others and with oneself. This situation had an impact on everyone, sometimes more so on the most fragile people or on those who were going through a period of upheaval in their lives.


Adolescence is one of those moments. Rich in emotions, full of changes, the ability to adapt is sometimes put to the test with possible wobbles. Just like lockdown, where there was the world before and the world after, adolescence is a delicate transition where what was is no longer and what will be is not yet.

In this context, Children Action created a participatory installation entitled ado-les-sens Labyrinth, conceived as an ephemeral interactive museum around adolescence and the risk of suicide. This unique exhibition was conceived using art as a means of prevention and communication, thus allowing for information, exchange and dialogue on this issue in a playful manner.

The Labyrinth in a few figures: 76 works and interactive installations; 2,371 visitors; 507 post-it notes "to me at 16"; 302 testimonies; 25 media coverage.



ACCESS TO CARE

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Access to health care is highly dependent on place of birth and surrounding environment, with profound inequalities depending on the country. Thousands of children with health issues are unable to access adequate treatment due to a lack of financial resources, necessary skills, medication or appropriate facilities.

Since 1996, Children Action has set up surgical programs aimed at providing access to relevant and quality care for children aged 0 to 18. The Foundation surrounds itself with the best European specialists in the medical field, not only to treat but also to promote the transfer of knowledge to local medical teams. Since 2020, the health crisis and the quarantines in the different countries have unfortunately not allowed the Foundation's surgical teams to go to the field.

In 2021, 50 children with cerebral palsy were equipped with a specially adapted molded wheelchair.

52 children with heart malformations have benefited from sometimes life-saving operations performed by our partner surgical teams at the Tamduc Clinic in Ho Chi Minh City and the VietDuc Hospital in Hanoi.

Professor Eric Bey and Doctor Michel Brachet, members of the Foundation's surgical team, have gathered hundreds of pictures in a book retracing twenty years of surgical experience in the field of burns surgery. Through these photos, they share their expertise, thus offering an exceptionally rich and precious tool for local surgeons.

Since the beginning of its surgical programs, the Foundation has organised 335 missions allowing the treatment of 14,558 children. We owe this progress, these thousands of children whose lives have been transformed by surgery, to the surgeons and medical teams who work alongside us, driven by rigor and the desire to offer the best care.



PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

Approximately 12 million girls aged 15–19 and at least 777,000 girls under 15 give birth each year in developing regions, representing 11% of births worldwide.

For some adolescents, pregnancy and childbearing are planned and desired, but for many others, they are not. Poverty, lack of education, and limited employment opportunities are factors that contribute to early pregnancy. Often, adolescents choose to have a child because their prospects are limited and the child becomes their life project.

Social consequences for pregnant and unmarried adolescents may include stigma, rejection, or violence from spouses, relatives, and peers. Pregnancy and motherhood often cause adolescents to drop out of school, jeopardizing their educational and employment opportunities. The lack of personal, social and financial resources of some young mothers is a risk factor for the development of their children and can substantially influence the future of these babies.

In Argentina and Peru, Children Action runs programs aimed at supporting teenage mothers and fathers by strengthening their autonomy, providing access to essential rights, developing a life plan and preserving family ties. Particular attention is paid to the development of the children, with special emphasis on protective factors to ensure their well-being.



PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

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PROJECT JAKAIRA - Argentina

Since 2003, Children Action has been running the Jakaira project with the Kaleidos Foundation of Argentina, which accompanies teenage mothers, fathers and their babies. The team offers them a personalized solution and multidisciplinary support. It also works with the social health network that surrounds young parents by setting up awareness workshops in schools. Jakaira is present in Buenos Aires and in Traslasierra.

In 2021, Jakaira supported 67 mothers, 63 children and 11 fathers. The program has reached 1,320 pupils, teachers and students.

After 18 years of experience in the field of teenage parenting and an established recognition at the national level, the Kaleidos Foundation and Children Action have decided to share this know-how by setting up the RED MAPA platform. This platform will allow access and transmission of the methods and tools developed by Jakaira to the various structures dedicated to supporting teenage parents throughout Argentina.

PROJECT RED MAMI - Peru

In Lima, the Foundation set up the Red Mami project in 2009 in collaboration with the Taller de Los Niños Association. This project supports teenage mothers in the favela of San Juan de Lurigancho.

The program comprising 12 months of intensive assistance and 12 months of follow-up, focuses more specifically on access to health and identity rights, defence in case of violence, strengthening of resources and autonomy with the creation of a "support network" for each mother. Back to school and employment are also part of the program.

In 2021, 344 new mothers between the ages of 11 and 19 were reached, bringing the total number of mothers assisted to 880. 23.5% of them were under the age of 15.

COLLABORATION WITH COLIS DU COEUR, PARTAGE AND CARTONS DU COEUR – Switzerland

In the context of the social crisis resulting from the COVID pandemic, Children Action has joined forces with Colis du Coeur, Partage and Cartons du Coeur to distribute basic necessities to several thousand children from families in precarious situations in French-speaking Switzerland.

In 2020 and 2021, thanks to the generosity of our donors, the following food and hygiene products were distributed:

- 50,920 litres of milk
- 14,937 baskets of fruits and vegetables
- 480,188 diapers
- 749 kilos of apple compote
- 1,512 kilos of muesli
- 2,560 kilos of cocoa powder
- 1,120 kilos of cookies
- 2,160 kilos of spreads
- 3,573 cans of baby milk powder
- 1,008 baby bottles
- 11,664 packages of teats
- 7,776 baby pacifiers
- 1,152 baby shower/bath gels
- 840 boxes of baby cookies

GAMES, TOYS & CLOTHING – Romania

In November 2021, Children Action, in collaboration with Espoiroumanie, organised a collection of toys, games and clothing that were transported to the Bacau region in Romania.

Thanks to the solidarity and generosity of the Foundation's friends, 20 m³ of items were distributed.

SCHOOL EQUIPMENT – Sri Lanka – Vietnam

In Sri Lanka, since 2015, Children Action has been funding **500 school kits each year for the poorest pupils**. The distribution is carried out by our local partner, the Foundation of Goodness. These kits include the necessary equipment for one year of schooling: uniform, bag, shoes, books, pencils and notebooks.

In Vietnam, since 2007, the Foundation has been organising notebook distribution in a dozen provinces. **Nearly 130,000 notebooks are distributed each year to more than 8,000 pupils from disadvantaged families**, covering their needs for the entire school year.

SCHOOL MEALS – Vietnam

Since 2007, Children Action has been providing school canteen meals for children from very disadvantaged families.

In 2021, **330,183 meals and snacks were served to nearly 700 children**, providing them with a balanced diet.

CENTRE FOR YOUNG BLIND CHILDREN – Vietnam

Children Action has been working with a group of blind and disadvantaged children in Vietnam since 1994. Caring for them from the youngest age means offering them a brighter future.

Some 30 blind children stay each year at the assistance centre funded by the Foundation. They attend school, learn the Braille alphabet, play several music instruments, learn basic massage techniques and attend national and international parasport competitions.

In 2021, the centre welcomed 36 blind children. It was closed for a few months due to Covid, although it still provided remote support. Since 1994, over 630 children have stayed there, some of them throughout their schooling.



WELLBEING IN HOSPITAL

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The Foundation sets up programs in the pediatric services of the University Hospitals of Geneva to improve the quality of life of sick children and their relatives during the often difficult periods of hospitalisation and to provide support to the care teams.

SABRINA PROJECT - Geneva

Within the pediatric onco-hematology Unit of the University Hospitals of Geneva, the Sabrina Project provides professional services to accompany sick children, to relieve their parents and to meet the needs of the care teams.

Hospitalised children benefit from art therapy sessions, recreational, artistic and educational activities. These actions provide:

- an approach that allows them to express themselves on the disease in a different way;
- an entertaining moment that can help them forget about their suffering for a while;
- time off for parents.

As part of the Sabrina Project, Children Action offers:

- visits from medical students who come two hours a day, five days a week, to play, entertain and discuss with the children;
- an art therapist four hours a week;
- a storyteller four hours a month;
- a home-based repeater service to facilitate the resumption of the school year after sometimes long and repeated hospital stays;

- the coordination of the Pediatric Palliative Care Group. A multidisciplinary team supports children at end of life and their families. It operates in the hospital or at home, providing essential support during this painful period;
- a contribution to the McDonald House for each night spent by the families of a child affected by cancer.

In 2021, 1,109 hours of support, representing 338 activities with 270 sick children and their families were offered.

TRAINING IN CLINICAL HYPNOSIS AND THERAPEUTIC COMMUNICATION - Geneva

Since 2018, Children Action has been collaborating in the implementation of training programs in therapeutic communication and clinical hypnosis launched within the Child and Adolescent Department of the University Hospitals of Geneva. These courses allow the care teams to acquire specific knowledge in the management of pain, stress and anxiety induced by disease or care with a real benefit for the patients of the pediatric services. Transforming a blood test into a snowball fight, the insertion of a gastric tube into a toboggan ride or intense pain into a trip to the end of the world... the challenge is ambitious, but brilliantly met by the children and the professionals trained.

In 2020 and 2021, the training program experienced some breaks, as the training centre was closed due to Covid. It will continue until 2023.

By the end of 2021, the pediatric component had 429 caregivers trained in pediatric therapeutic communication and 75 hypnosis practitioners, allowing approximately 500 children per year to benefit from this treatment.
